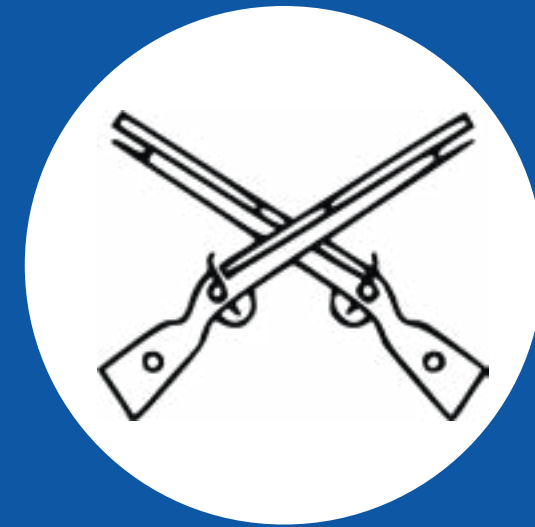
Celebrating the Semiquincentennial: A Journey Through Revolutionary America

Optional Extended Stops

Lexington & Concord, Massachusetts

1-2 days

Sites of the first battles of the American Revolution (April 19, 1775). Visit Minute Man National Historical Park, North Bridge, and battle reenactments scheduled for April 2026.

Saratoga, New York

1-2 days

The Battles of Saratoga (1777) were the turning point of the Revolution, convincing France to support the American cause. Saratoga National Historical Park offers battlefield tours and living history programs.

Valley Forge, Pennsylvania

1 day

Site of the Continental Army's brutal winter encampment (1777-78). Valley Forge National Historical Park is just outside Philadelphia.

Gettysburg, Pennsylvania

1-2 days

While Civil War history (1863), Gettysburg represents the ongoing struggle to achieve America's founding ideals of liberty and equality.

PHILADELPHIA, PA

Duration: 7-10 days

Best Timing: Late June - Early July 2026

Why Philadelphia for America 250?

Philadelphia is the epicenter of the semiquincentennial celebration as the birthplace of American independence. This is where the Declaration of Independence was signed at Independence Hall on July 4, 1776.

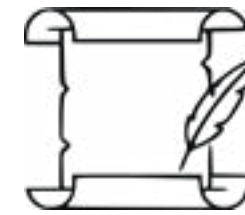
Historical Significance

Founded by William Penn in 1682, Philadelphia became the most important city in colonial America. It hosted both Continental Congresses, witnessed the birth of the Constitution in 1787, and served as the nation's capital from 1790-1800. The city was home to Benjamin Franklin and countless other Founding Fathers who shaped the nation.

Washington, D.C.

Duration: 5-7 days

Best Timing: Spring (Cherry Blossoms) or July 4th

Why Washington D.C. for America 250?

As the nation's capital, Washington D.C. will host spectacular commemorations on the National Mall and throughout its world-class museums.

Historical Significance

Though not founded until 1790, Washington D.C. was specifically designed to be the permanent capital of the United States. The city's location between Maryland and Virginia was a compromise brokered by Alexander Hamilton and Thomas Jefferson. Pierre L'Enfant's grand design created a city of monuments and memorials that honor America's democratic ideals.

Monuments & Memorials

The National Mall is home to some of the most iconic landmarks in the country, including the Lincoln Memorial, Washington Monument, Jefferson Memorial, Vietnam Veterans Memorial, and the World War II Memorial.

Get a firsthand look at American democracy in action by visiting the U.S. Capitol, the White House, and the Supreme Court.



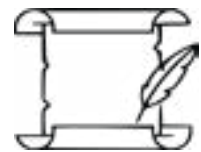
Neighborhoods

Washington D.C. is an incredible city packed with history, culture, and inspiration around every corner. With the 250th anniversary celebrations in full swing this summer, there has never been a better time to visit the nation's capital!

Boston, MA

Duration: 6-8 days

Best Timing: June (Battle of Bunker Hill anniversary) or April (Patriots' Day)

Why Boston for America 250?

Boston is the birthplace of the American Revolution. The first shots of the war were fired nearby at Lexington and Concord, and Boston's revolutionary spirit sparked the movement for independence.

Historical Significance

Founded in 1630 by Puritans, Boston became a hotbed of revolutionary activity by the 1760s. The Boston Tea Party (1773), Boston Massacre (1770), and Paul Revere's Midnight Ride (1775) all occurred here. The city's patriots organized resistance to British rule and inspired the colonies to unite for independence.

- Knox Trail 250 - January-July commemoration of Henry Knox's artillery journey
- Evacuation Day 250 - March 17, parade celebrating British withdrawal from Boston
- Paul Revere's Ride 250th - April 18-19, reenactment from Boston to Lexington

- Boston Pops Fireworks Spectacular - July 4th on the Charles River Esplanade (official event)
- Sail250 Tall Ships - International tall ships visiting Boston Harbor

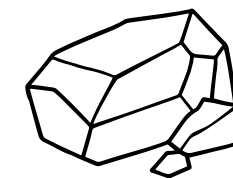

New York, NY



Duration: 5-7 days

Best Timing: July 3-8 for Sail4th 250 or New Year's Eve/Day

New York (then New Amsterdam) was founded by the Dutch in 1624 and taken by the British in 1664. During the Revolution, nearly one-third of all battles were fought on New York soil. George Washington was inaugurated as the first president at Federal Hall in New York City on April 30, 1789, and the city served as the nation's capital from 1785-1790.

Why New York for America 250?

New York played a crucial role in the Revolution and served as the first capital of the United States. The city will host the largest international maritime celebration in U.S. history.

- Virginia 250 Passport - Visit 70+ historic sites, collect stamps, win prizes
- Mount Vernon Revitalized Exhibit - "George Washington: A Revolutionary Life" opening spring 2026

Why Virginia for America 250?

Virginia was the largest and most influential colony, providing four of the first five presidents and leading the push for independence.



Jamestown (1607) was the first permanent English settlement in North America. Virginia's House of Burgesses (1619) was the first legislative assembly in the colonies. Virginia patriots like Patrick Henry, Thomas Jefferson, and George Washington led the revolutionary cause. The decisive Battle of Yorktown (1781) ended the war on Virginia soil.
